PROGRAM – SCRIPPS ENCINITAS AT 50-LOOK AT US NOW! DR. ERIC LOVELL

Dave Kulchin introduced our two speakers today; **Mike Uzitas**, Senior Director of Clinical Services at Scripps Encinitas Hospital, and **Dr. Eric Lovell**, Chair of the Emergency Room Department. Like **Kulchin**, **Uzitas** went to the University of Florida and Dr. Lovell got his PhD at the University of Virginia Medical School. **Uzitas** noted that Scripps Health has been a Fortune 100 Best Company for six years in a row and is #43 company overall in 2013.

Scripps Encinitas Hospital opened in 1964. The earliest days of the hospital can be traced to 1960, when Dwight Cook, MD, and Charles Clark, MD, bought property on Santa Fe Drive and Devonshire Road to build a small medical-dental building for their practice. They soon realized the community needed to expand its health care infrastructure, so they turned to patient and friend Herman "Pop" Wiegand, who put up his Bank of America stock as collateral for a loan to build a hospital on the same property.

Groundbreaking for the hospital took place in 1963, and in spring 1964 the doors opened to the 60-bed Encinitas Convalescent Hospital. In 1978 the hospital was sold to Scripps Health and the facility was renamed Scripps Memorial Hospital Encinitas.



Scripps Encinitas receives more than 80,000 patient visits per year and offers a broad spectrum of services, including complex neurological and vascular procedures, 24-hour emergency care and heart, cancer, orthopedic and rehabilitation services. It is North County's first Joint Commission-certified primary stroke center, and it offers the first brain injury rehabilitation program in San Diego, Imperial, and Riverside counties accredited by the Commission of Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities.

Bob Fenner mentioned that he received care at Scripps Encinitas following his stroke and that the care was great. His only problem is took him about five hours longer than expected to get released.

Dr. Lovell He reviewed the current expansion plans, which will more than double the size of the hospital's current emergency department and increase the number of medical-surgical beds by 43 percent. The Critical Care Building is the centerpiece of the hospital's \$94 million second phase of expansion, which also includes a new central energy plant and various infrastructure improvements. Scripps will also provide more than \$4 million in public infrastructure improvements, including enhancements to Devonshire Drive and the southbound I-5 off-ramp at Santa Fe Drive. The first phase of expansion included construction of an 884-space parking structure, which opened in spring 2011.

The Critical Care Building's first floor (open by the summer of 2014) will house a 27-bed emergency department, with all private rooms. The second floor will be home to 36 medical-surgical inpatient beds for patients who are recovering from surgery or acute illnesses. These beds are also used by inpatients admitted via the emergency department, improving the flow of emergency care.

Kulchin asked **Dr. Lovell** to discuss Young Leaders in Healthcare a program for high school students that includes a series of classroom activities and professional medical speakers preparing the students for a future in the medical field. It was run by the son of one of former members, **Dr. Glen McCartney**.
